Many of the newspaper's best and most widely quoted editorials in recent years were Harry's.



Ducaten had opinions and convictions, and it was not his mature to dodge en issue or compromise with the truth.

He kept his viewpoint sharp and as modern as noncerow by studying a number of the nation's leading metropolitan newspapers every day.

He had the wonderful faculty of being able to absorb the printed page with amaring swiftness, and kept abreast of the times by reading all of the noteworthy books as unlikity as they arrived from the publishers' hands.





Yet there was nothing of the bookworm about Harry Ducaten.

He was a hall fellow well met, who maintained the common touch and walked among his fellows as a man among men.

At 62 Harry enjoyed living very much.

He was far too vigorous a man to die.

Yet, If death were inevitable yesterday, the visitation was the swift, merciful kind that Harry himself would have wanted had the choice been his to make.

He leaves in Betleville today, a host of close friends, acquaintances and admirers, who comprehend their great loss, but find is difficult to realize that Barry Dursten is gone forever.

His saddened newspaper co-workers cannot find words to express their ineffable grief, save to express to his bereaved wife and family their deepest and most heartfelt sympathy.

How well he fell asleep! Like some proud river, widening roward the sea: Calmly and grandly, silently and doop.
