Connecting to Our Values

I will be finishing my Leadership Belleville program on May 3. This wonderful ninemonth program has not only helped me see Belleville in new dimensions but has also helped me develop my own sense of leadership.

One of our recent readings included an essay entitled "Ten Qualities that Made Abraham Lincoln a Great Leader" by Catherine L. Moreton and based on work by presidential historian Doris Kerns Goodwin. Two that stood out to me in my work right now were these: "strength to adhere to fundamental goals" and "ability to communicate goals and vision."

As this church's senior pastor, I believe that part of my duty is to ensure that we are connected to and living into our values. How many of you know our values? (1) We believe all people matter to God and are welcome here; (2) We strive to be servants in service to others; and (3) We need Christian education for good faith and life.

Just for this article, I am going to focus on the first value stated –not at the exclusion of the importance of the other two values. Genesis 1 states that all people were made in the image of God. As a congregation, this principle is extremely important to us. By the events held at the church to our youth group activities, and by the way we welcome all families in our Mother's Day Out as well, and the way area organizations meet in our building, we are cultivating a culture of ensuring that the people in our community – especially people who have often been forgotten – are valued. In my preaching, I try to connect scripture to our work in making certain all people know they matter to God.

Let's take this a step further: how do your efforts in our building and on our property connect to this value? Through upkeeping an accessible church, our neighbors with disabilities have a place to worship. People who have been alienated by other congregations because of who they love or what they believe have a space to worship. How does your work on church finance connect to this value? Staff and volunteers who help manage our finances aid St. Paul UCC's various boards in their service. For instance, their work makes it easier for our mission team to collect and distribute funds to area organizations in need.

While these are just a few examples, this is to say that every single one of you has a piece ensuring that our congregation lives into its values. With each hour and dollar spent, your contributions adhere to our congregation's goals. Your work is crucial to St. Paul UCC, and I would like to affirm this and thank you!


From the President's corner...



<u>Tornado</u>

During Events in the Sanctuary DO NOT USE THE ELEVATOR

- Wait unit there is an All Clear signal before exiting the building
 During events in Heritage Hall
- Move quickly to the door of Heritage Hall and go downstairs into the Great Room
- Move through the Great Room to the hallway and Genesis rooms
- Wait unit there is an All Clear signal before exiting the building

Fire In the event of an alarm "RACE":

- R: Remove anyone from immediate danger
- A: Activate building fire alarm system at PULL STATIONS AT NEAREST EXIT & call 911
- C: Confine the fire by closing doors
- E: Evacuate, leave the building and assemble in parking lot-near the marque. Extinguish the fire, if it can be done safely - DO NOT USE THE ELEVATOR
- Crawl if there's smoke Feel doors before opening Go to the nearest exit
- If you are on fire Stop, Drop and Roll

Stay away from windows

Stay indoors until shaking stops and it is safe to exit

- Call 911

Active Shooter

During the situation

- Know the nearest escape route
- Keep your hands visible & SILENCE cell phone
- If unable to escape, drop and hide out of view if possible
- Block entry to your hiding place and lock doors if possible
- Last resort and only if your life is in imminent danger -Attempt to incapacitate the shooter
 <u>When First Responders Arrive</u>
 - Remain calm & follow their instructions
- Keep hands visible at all times and avoid quick movements

All St. Paul Leadership Development Grants will be applied for through and recommended by an established St. Paul governance body (i.e. the Church Council, a Board, Committee or Task Force), to the St. Paul Leadership Development Fund Committee for approval and disbursement.

The Leadership Development Fund was created by Pastor Gus Kuether in honor of his 60th year in the ministry and will be held by St. Paul UCC as a designated fund. The Leadership Development Fund will be administered by the Leadership Development Fund Committee. All grants will be partial and will only cover part of the total costs for attendance and participation. Upon completion, an oral or written report of learnings and suggestions for application at St. Paul will be rendered to the St. Paul recommending body within 60 days.



Operation Shimmer

Have you ever marveled at the sun across the lake at DuBois Center? You're not the only one. Whether from a canoe, pontoon, bridge or beach, you can't help but appreciate the shimmer that comes across the lake from sunrise to sunset. In many ways, the lake is the heart of our camp. It supports camp activities, as well as wildlife and plants. Stand still and



listen to the water lap, and feel the pulse of the camp. Just as human hearts sometimes need a little extra care, our lake needs some extra care right now, with some pressing improvements. The spillway pipe has outlived its lifespan. Temporary repairs bought time, but some Muskrat Love (for those of you old enough to remember the song) has hastened the need to make a major repair before summer camp this year. This means cutting the dam, replacing the pipe, rebuilding the dirt, and resurfacing the road. The only week out of the year when this is logically feasible is Holy Week, when there are no groups in camp. There's one other improvement needing to happen before summer, and that's air conditioning in Oak Lodge. Can we get an Amen? The shimmer of the lake in late July would look so much prettier if we all were shimmering a little less in the summer heat. It also will make the camp more attractive and accessible for campers and guests. Some dedicated AC funds are waiting to be used, and they will cover a portion of the cost. So welcome to Operation Shimmer. These expenses are larger than our typical improvement, and they need to happen over the course of the next four months. Based on estimates for both projects, our goal is \$60,000, with \$10,000 already received. The first money in goes to repair the spillway so the work can happen in April. Air conditioning will go in second, but still before camp fills in June. It's a tall order in a short time, but these projects require immediate attention. Dubois Center has tackled sudden expenses in the past with support from across the Conference. This time is no different. We need your donations, your Lenten fundraisers, your popup yard sales and trivia nights to meet the \$60,000 goal by the end of May. These repairs just can't wait. Help us keep our aquatic heart healthy and keep the shimmer on the lake. Donations can be sent to either address on the back, designated for Operation Shimmer. Thank you.
