This past year has been a unique experience for all at St. Paul United Church of Christ. We've been faced with making many decisions throughout the year, looking to God for wisdom, and working to ensure the safety for all involved in our congregation. Near the end of March 2020, we began our sheltering in place. Our ways of worshiping changed at that time. Each of us recorded our parts in our homes. With the help of Rick Haar as well as Tina Lake-Hopper and Bill Wade, each piece of the service was edited together.

Besides worship, we had to pause many of our in-person activities and meetings and began to use Zoom as a way to meet. Each week, after our 9am service, we hold a fellowship hour, and during the initial months of the pandemic, we had Wednesday night social hour. I used Facebook Live to check in with our congregants while we faced weeks in our homes with limited interaction with others. Our educational opportunities like Confirmation and our Social Justice Book Group continued through Zoom. And our first virtual congregational meeting happened on Zoom in December 2020. (The Bylaws were adjusted to include online meetings.)

This also gave us an opportunity to be creative as possible, thinking outside of the box to be St. Paul UCC in the midst of a pandemic. Our Congregational Care team delivered little items to members who were not connected online. More phone calls were made and letters sent by teams and individuals. Our Stewardship team created new fundraising opportunities (such as masks, postcards, bookmarks, and 50/50 drawings) since we couldn't hold an event this year. And our Christian Education team held VBS online for the first time this year and visited our young people at Christmastime with Santa in our caravan.

Many lengthy conversations occurred and difficult decisions were made regarding regathering the church and reopening MDO. We produced a video which indicated how our worship services would flow. In the summer, we began our outdoor services, knowing that guidelines recommend holding outdoor events when possible for the safety of all. Within a couple of months, we began to hold our indoor services with a number of guidelines. We were happy to have these events until November when the virus numbers increased. We switched back to holding the worship services virtually, including our Blue Christmas and Christmas Eve services. Neal Holliday helped us record our weekly non-traditional services on Zoom.

MDO leaders also met throughout the year to decide the best time to reopen and worked on guidelines to keep our students, teachers, and helpers safe. In January 2020, MDO held its first classes for the 2020-2021 school year.

I believe that this past year has transformed our congregation for the future and for the better. Streaming our services will be part of our Sunday morning offerings - even when times are back to "normal." We have seen how communicating on many different platforms to many different generations is a crucial part of our congregation. Having tools like Zoom will give us the opportunity to include congregants in our meetings even when they are out of town, recovering from surgery, or when we need to stay home during inclement weather.


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I look forward to the time when we can safely have over 50 in worship and hold the grand opening for Heritage Hall that we planned for last spring. We may be wearing masks and adjusting our worship and meetings for a while, but I see us gathering more and more in the coming weeks and months.

I continue to serve on the Illinois South Conference Gathering Team. I attended the Day of Discipleship in February 2020 (held in Waterloo) and Annual Conference Gathering for Illinois South UCC in October 2020 which was held online. I've taken part in online learning opportunities - including a continuing education through Boston University School of Theology and a series on worship from the Worship Design Studio.

Thank you to Wayne Caughman for his leadership throughout 2020 as well as all of our leaders and those involved in conversations regarding regathering. Your time and energy kept us going and growing even when we weren't physically together. Finally, I would like to thank you to all of you for your well wishes and gifts for my recent wedding in July 2020!

Music Ministry Dr. Bill Wade

I began as director of music and organist on January 2, 2020. The music ministry as of January, 2020 included the adult Chancel Choir (18 active members), Glory Ringers (12 ringers), Women's Ensemble, and Men's Ensemble.

Among the priorities of the first couple of months was continuing the choral and handbell program and preparing weekly service music for worship. I was also tasked with an unfinished project of researching a music storage system, and participating in the recruitment of a non-traditional music director. I also discovered many music survey responses from the congregation during the previous year. I responded to each of the surveys with a personal note addressing the celebrations and concerns identified.

In February, we had the pleasure of bringing John Posth on staff as the music director for non-traditional music. John immediately ingratiated himself by becoming an important participant in the chancel choir and the handbell choir. It has been a pleasure working with this talented and knowledgeable colleague.

There were some significant deferred maintenance issues with the Schantz organ and I worked closely with Richard and Luanne Murphy from Murphy Music Service to identify and repair most of the problems.

The handbell choir prepared several pieces for the SpRINGfest 2020 mass handbell ringing event at Peace Lutheran in Saint Louis on February 29, 2020, facilitated by composer and artist David Weck. We had about 10 ringers who participated in a day-long workshop and culminating concert. This was a wonderful educational and team building experience for the handbell choir and exposed our ringers to about 100 other ringers from the Saint Louis metro area.

We were able to locate and purchase a music shelving system and have it installed thanks to the hard work of Pat Kinney and the Property Management team. Because of Pat's efforts, music began being relocated from the bell room to the music storage room in January, 2021.


By March 2020, it became apparent that mitigation strategies were going to be needed to address the emerging pandemic of COVID-19. The leadership teams and staff worked tirelessly to address the ongoing needs of the congregation, the music ministry, and the public health implications of all stakeholders at St. Paul UCC. Once it was decided that we would suspend group activities and in-person worship, the entire music program, like all other programs in the church, faced the daunting task of quickly migrating to a pre-recorded, virtual program.

Choir practice continued with 15 dedicated individuals who met online once a week for rehearsal and videotaping of the hymns and anthems and then individually recorded each of their voice parts and submitted them asynchronously for compilation and mixing each week. There was some attrition because some singers either didn't have the technical equipment necessary to continue participating in virtual choir, or did not feel they had the additional two to three hours each week for this type of endeavor. We have been able to gain at least one singer who had moved out of state, but is able to join us each week now that we are meeting online! For the handbell choir, rehearsals were suspended until the Spring when gathering outside was possible. We did meet several times during the Summer and recorded some service music for airing during our online worship.

Music for each worship service has been mostly recorded and edited in advance and then streamed online at the appropriate time. This has enabled us to offer a worship service that is available at any time at the convenience of worshippers near and far.

We began the Sunday afternoon/evening Non-Traditional Worship service throughout the Spring and Summer and that provided an opportunity for people to experience a semblance of congregational worship, albeit socially distanced and adorned with masks.

We had a very different but worshipful Lent/Easter and Advent/Christmas in 2020. Thanks to the assistance of the staff and volunteers we have been able to continue a music program that looks and feels much different than any of us anticipated in January, 2020! This has been a year of opportunity, necessary flexibility, and no insignificant amount of stress for everyone. Nevertheless, we have survived, maybe even thrived, and emerged stronger.



John Posth **Non-Traditional**

I started working for St. Paul on March 1, 2020, just before the pandemic made us change the way we worship and gather. During the short time before the quarantine, I attended a seminar in Iowa held at Luther College under the direction of Paul Vasille and the organization Music Makes Community. At this seminar we spent time singing together and teaching songs without any paper. I was excited to get back to St. Paul so that I could start to implement what I learned in Iowa with our congregation.

We were planning, at the time, to start a non-traditional service sometime around May that would incorporate different worship techniques like singing by rote, hands-on worship stations, and a conversational and physical aspect from the congregation. Luckily, we were still able to start this non-traditional service, even though it had to take a different form than Pastor Michelle and I had imagined before. Our non-traditional service began in July of 2020. We met outside every Sunday (except for two that were cancelled for weather) from July 12th through November 8th, at which time we moved online to our Zoom format that we have done since November 15th through today. I believe that our services are getting better each week and our non-traditional service is starting to define itself into something truly unique.

Before our non-traditional service began in July, I sang hymns for our 9am service to help with some music before the choir took over weekly hymn duties. Once our 9am service went indoors for a short time, I helped with our technology team to stream our services live. We encountered a few issues that persisted, but I am confident that when we go back inside we will be able to work out those issues.

I have also sang in the choir and played with handbells under Bill Wade's leadership, and assisted with some technology for choir. I have been blessed to be able to work with such a wonderful team. Thanks to Michelle, Craig, Bill, and Tina for being such an easy team to work with so that we were able to provide services for our congregation through this crazy time!

Confirmation continued to go strong with regular class meetings happening virtually.

Pastoral care visits were not able to be had due to the in person nature of them. For the safety of the members, With You team members, and the pastor(s) that decision was made. But, phone calls, letters and cards, and virtual visits were still able to be done. The Congregational Care Team called each member of the homebound/shut-in list along with others identified by the church staff and With You Team.

It was a difficult year. One that will hopefully never be repeated. But, with the knowledge of Ecclesiastes 1:9 it is probable that hope will inevitably fail. The faithful knowing that we have been through this past year and emerged on the other side makes another faith a reality; that we are strong, ingenuitive, and flexible.

Mother's Day Out recognizes the educational, emotional, and physical needs of children from the ages of two to five. We affirm parents as the primary educator of their children and our role is one of support and enrichment.

Our program is governed, and policies are set by the MDO team. This panel is chaired by Lisa Smith, Rick Haar, Rachel Budko, Sue Hoffmann, Pastor Michelle and a teacher representative.

Classes meet Monday through Friday from 9:00 to 12:30 for children two through five years of age. Our total present enrollment is 62 children, we only have one opening currently.

Our 2020-2021 fee schedule is: 1 child attending 1 day per week.......\$75.00 per month


1 child attending 2 days per week......\$125.00 per month

Finance Team

Serving on the 2020 Finance Team were Dana Rosenzweig, Laurence Walton, Mike Pierce, Terry Kalinowski, Wayne Kniepkamp and Staff Liaison Stephenie Bauza. The Team once again willingly took on role of being responsible stewards of the Church's financial resources. As in past years, the Team worked closely with other groups within the Church to coordinate responsible budgeting and spending. Approvals for levels of expenditures were once again employed and there continued to be good fiscal controls and practices in place.

As with every entity within the Church, 2020 was marked by responding to the challenges created by the pandemic. Initially there was concern regarding potential for markedly reduced revenues. The 2020 budget had been crafted using historical data and both expenses and revenues were felt to be accurate representations. There was little room to significantly reduce operational expenses, thus the concern regarding inadequate revenues. We recognized that certain revenues, such as building income, would be impossible to recover if the pandemic continued. Much to the dismay of all of us, the pandemic did continue longer than hoped.

However, what was also not fully anticipated was the commitment and generosity of all members during 2020. The above concerns over lower revenues were not realized because of your giving - nearly \$30,000 more than in 2019! This amount does not include giving for Outreach & Missions that was \$2,000 more than in 2019. Of note, contributions to the Food Pantry doubled.

Other significant achievements:

Revenues (\$677,837) exceeded Expenses (\$603,411) – a net of \$74,426. Year end on-hand cash was increased to nearly 1.5 months of operating expenses. (First time in recent history and a great relief.) Secured a \$67,300 PPP loan. (All indicators suggest it will be fully forgiven.) Continued to eliminate dormant Cash Accounts.

The continued responsible management of the Church's finances allowed us to end 2020 fully in a position of strength. In collaboration with all Church Teams and staff, we are poised to meet the new challenges and opportunities for St. Paul in the coming year. Again, our many thanks to all members for their generosity in 2020!

Property Team

2020What a year of challenges, in every aspect of the word. During the year the board met via zoom a couple of times to go over matters happening at that moment. We did not need to meet every month, as there was nothing going on due to the entire facility being shut down.

The members of the team that attended the meetings that we did have via zoom were Wayne Caughman, Pat Kinney, Lou Ryseff, myself. Dave Hoffmann and Roger Harris also attended to provide any information regarding Heritage Hall's completion.

Even though we did not meet every month, I stayed in touch with Pat Kinney, our facility manager, and others through our monthly council zoom meetings.

The regular maintenance and preventative maintenance were continued even though we were not in the church by Pat Kinney. He finds plenty to do, and we thank him for that. He is a real team player!

Right before the pandemic started, we were trying to find instructions as to how to put together the new mobile music filing system that we purchased used in 2019. To no avail, we could not put it together in house, and we were faced with finding an outside installation company. I had used a group in St. Louis called Precision, and they were able to build a flooring subfloor that contained the tracks for the mobile files to move on. They got the installation completed in 1 day and Pat assembled the shelves to move along the tracks. To date, Pat, and Erin, our new custodial worker, have organized and filled the shelves with our vast music library. Thank you to them!

The biggest challenge that we faced this year had to do with the playground that is used by MDO. The weeds that grow in the mulch continue to be a difficult problem to deal with all spring, summer and fall. We were also concerned with the children's safety with the wood product. So, a small group met outside, socially distanced, at the playground to discuss how to go about amending the situation. Those in attendance were Dave Hoffmann, Sue Hoffmann, Wayne Caughman, Lou Ryseff, Pat Kinney, myself and Dana Rosenweig. Through many meetings and a good deal of research by all, we determined that a product called Kiddie Kushion would be used. We checked with state and local boards, and decided it would be the best product. Sonnenberg's provided a nice discount for the product, along with the delivery. We also determined that Pat could do the work of leveling the existing product, putting a weed barrier down, and then installing the product over the top of the weed barrier. The Kiddie Kushion was purchased, with our budgeted money, along with a nice donation. Pat tried to do this before winter, but the rainy weather did not allow for the mulch to dry thoroughly enough before winter set in. He plans to do this in the next coming months.

We organized an outside work day to help spruce up the front of the church. About 12 people showed up to power wash, plant, weed, and apply rock. We had to tear out the existing foliage and replace with the rock due to burrowing by problematic ground hogs on the South side of the main sanctuary. Groundhogs may be cute, but they do a great deal of damage. We are trying to amend the situation with them by applying rock, along with a layer of chicken wire to keep them from digging, and causing potential damage to our foundation. Keep your fingers crossed!

Pat painted the original wood doors to Heritage Hall on the exterior side. He removed and painted the wrought iron hardware, and even painted the steps leading to them, so that when we are ready to use the space, it looks nice. We added 2 planting beds with new donated perennials and black granite chip rock, on either side of both of those doors to provide some much needed curb appeal!


During the long shut down of the church, we decided that it would be a great time to paint the corridors. Pat, Kyle, when he was with us, and then Erin, all took part in this project. It looks wonderful!

Another donation came in for additional screen shades, like the ones installed in 2019 in the library, for the windows in the church's business offices. Three windows were covered, and the original 2" faux wood blinds were moved to the youth room on the North side of the building. Again, Pat Kinney removed the blinds and re-installed them for us.

A new lease was signed with the Belleville Area Special Service Cooperative (BASSC) to continue using our residential facility at 205 West B street for a special needs school until June 30th of 2021. They continued to pay the rent throughout the pandemic. We plan on a slight increase in their rent to cover the damage that some residents create, which is then our responsibility to repair, being the landlord. We will also be adding a "time and material" clause to this contract to cover our costs.

As some of you know, we mysteriously had 4 large holes in the St. Paul window back in July. The church staff looked at the video footage, and did not see any human do any damage. It is still a mystery to this day. Pat put protection over the window until it could be fixed. We hired Art Glass Unlimited to take a look and provide a quote, as they have done all of the other repair work for our stained glass. They repaired it and matched the original color, texture and writing, without a problem. This was at a cost of \$2,300 which was paid for through donations.

I would like to thank our team members and especially Pat Kinney for all of his work, and for all of the volunteers and donations that helped with the many projects this past year! On to a new year, and a new set of goals! Here's to 2021!!!

Although the pandemic during the past year ceased most on site gatherings and stopped in person visits, our congregation actively volunteered to send cards, make delivery to homes, phone regularly, assure all were informed of church gatherings, develop new relationships while nourishing the current ones. Through these activities, God's work was continued and we became stronger.

SUBTEAMS

CHOIR/MUSIC

At the beginning of January, we were blessed to welcome Dr. Bill Wade to the leadership role of our Music Ministry. We thank him for his constant dedication, creativity, sharing his wide range of expertise, and for helping us to grow together. In February, a second blessing came through the vocals, dedication and musical skills of John Posth, Non-Traditional Music Director. We are grateful to these two people for bringing to our congregation their amazing abilities to lead us and to work together through the many 2020 challenges.

The Choir continued to meet every Wednesday evening throughout the year, resorting to Zoom rehearsals. Director Dr. Bill Wade e-mailed the music and instructions to each choir member prior to each rehearsal. On Wednesday, as the choir practiced the newly assigned music, they were visually recorded singing each selection. During the rehearsal or the following days, each choir member recorded their voices on their cell phones and e-mailed the recordings to our Director. The Technology Team then blended the visual recordings with the voices to create each Sunday's service. Everyone's skills expanded as the year progressed, even participating in video classes to learn how to improve our Zooming. Choir members became closer as we critiqued each ones homes and even welcomed members who no longer were in the area. Mary Mayo joined us every week from Nashville, TN. Choir members from other churches and areas were invited to join us, too.

The city of Belleville approved the closing of the block of 1st street east of the church so we could comfortably Social Distance for the Sunday 6:00 p.m. outdoor services, which changed to 4:00 p.m. as the days grew shorter. We rocked the neighborhood with guest vocalists and musicians at this non-traditional service, with Dr. Bill Wade weekly at the keyboard and John Posth with his vocals. During the pandemic, singing was discouraged, but foot tapping and moving to the music stirred our souls. Our well-attended outdoor services continued as long as the weather was in our favor.

In February, the Glory Ringers Handbell Choir, led by Dr. Bill Wade, joined ringers from across the St. Louis Metro area for the Handbell Springfest at Peace Lutheran Church, St. Louis. 

Radio and Website Teams


